Why are we here?

30 surface vehicle incidents

(This is only what has been reported to the NSW Resources Regulator)





What would it feel like?

A fully loaded:

- CAT 793 dump truck weighs 390t and travelling at just 30kph has the same energy or force as a Landcruiser Wagon travelling at 342kph
- CAT 785 dump truck weighs 250t and travelling at just 30kph has the same energy or force as a Landcruiser Wagon travelling at 273kph
- EPIROC MT60 dump truck weighs 104t and travelling at just 15kph has the same energy or force as a Landcruiser Wagon travelling at 89kph
- CAT AD/AE 45 dump truck weighs 85t and travelling at just 15kph has the same energy or force as a Landcruiser Wagon travelling at 80kph

What would it feel like being hit by a Landcruiser wagon travelling at these speeds?



















What are we seeing?

Workers not following site procedures

- Not using positive communication
- Failing to follow site road rules
- Failing to observe hazards in their work area
- Not driving to conditions
- Vehicle visibility not maintained (i.e. windscreen, window, mirrors not cleaned)
- Lack of caution at intersections



Work Health and Safety Act 2011

Section 28 Duties of workers (this means you!)


While at work, a worker must:

- a) take reasonable care for his or her own health and safety, and
- take reasonable care that his or her acts or omissions do not adversely affect the health and safety of other persons, and
- c) comply, so far as the worker is reasonably able, with any reasonable instruction that is given by the person conducting the business or undertaking to allow the person to comply with this Act, and
- d) co-operate with any reasonable policy or procedure of the person conducting the business or undertaking relating to health or safety at the workplace that has been notified to workers.


Technology does not replace you

Sites have invested a lot of time and money to manage the risk, but this doesn't cancel your obligations:

- Proximity detection
- Reversing cameras
- GPS systems
- Equipment warning alarms
- Speed monitoring
- Pre-start meeting information
- Other emerging technologies



- Use pos comms
- Drive to conditions
- Clean your window
- Look behind when reversing
- Other safe practices that RELY ON YOU





What can you do?

- Do not accept poor standards or behaviour
 SPEAK UP
- If you can't see STOP
- Not sure of, or unable to follow the rules
 STOP & ASK
- If procedures are not appropriate
 - REPORT





What can you do?

- If you're unsure about a task STOP
 & ASK
- If equipment is not fit for purpose
 - STAND IT DOWN
- Safe production DON'T RUSH
- If you have not been trained TELL YOUR SUPERVISOR





What we can do – our powers

- Notices of Concern to the mine
- Improvement Notices on the mine
- Prohibition notices on the mine
- Prohibition notice on YOU

If we reasonably believe you are risking your health and safety or the health and safety of others, we can prohibit you from operating equipment in NSW mines



In summary

- If you think it can't happen to you, then you are wrong
- YOU have a duty of care, under the Law
- Everyone has a role in a safe workplace
- No-one should accept unsafe practices or behaviour
